**Slow Music** (2004) - Phillip Houghton (1954 - 2017).

*"'Hope' is about humanity, peace, gentleness, compassion, kindness. 'Adoration' is a hymn to the spiritual essence of love ... beyond words, dogma, faith, desire and suffering, loving of all life"* - Phillip Houghton.

**Daring to Love** (2009) - Robert Davidson (1965)

A tender, melodic work that unabashedly celebrates love, written for Karin Schaupp.

**Five Bagatelles** (2009) - Mark Isaacs (1958)

Dedicated to the composer's uncle, Ike Isaacs (1919 - 1996)

**God of the Northern Forest** (1989) / **Kinkachoo, I Love You** (1998) - Phillip Houghton.

Though written almost a decade apart, Phillip suggested these two pieces be played as a pair.

*"God of the Northern Forest was written for ... Sebastian Jorgensen" (1938 - 2019) "... I drew inspiration from both Sebastian's Nordic heritage and his childhood experiences growing up in the Australian bush at Eltham, Victoria ... a few images brought these diverse backgrounds and elements together. One was ... the Eltham Copper Butterfly, and the other was a painting of a dark, brooding forest by the great 20thc Swiss painter Paul Klee."*

*Kinkachoo is dedicated "To Lyndall, to all my friends, life, love and the whole mysterious beautiful thing."* - Phillip Houghton.
